AA is a road to better living, with signs to guide us and friends to help us along the way - Essence of AA

SOBRIETY, OF ITSELF, is not a goal which insures victory; it is not merely an accomplishment which we achieve on a certain date. Sobriety in AA is much more. It is like finding, after a long search, the right road--a road on which we can travel confidently, knowing that we are going properly in the right direction.

I believe all of us experienced periods of sobriety even before AA-periods when we were on the wagon because of poor health, money troubles, or all kinds of other troubles. Most of the time, such periods were quite miserable, principally because we felt deprived of something and were not at all sure of ourselves. We knew it wouldn't work, at least not for any extended time. And it didn't. We tried many other tricks and subterfuges, but each time we ended up

A.A. at Fort Jay

The great majority of the men now at Fort Jay, Governors Island, N. Y., are confined for offenses evolving either directly or indirectly out of alcohol. Most cases of AWOL, desertion, disorderliness in uniform, assault and battery, and numerous others can be traced directly to alcohol. Many more premeditated offenses came about as a result of the man being drunk and not knowing what he was thinking of at the time of the offense.

An A.A. group was organized there in October, 1946 and from the start has been recognized by the authorities as a valuable factor in the "rehabilitation" program. The group has had its ups and downs since the organization, but

where we had started. We were lost! That is why many of us experience a feeling of elation when we meet AA. Then, finally, we know that this is the right road. We feel safe. We are going in the right direction.

We in AA have the soul-satisfying advantage of traveling a way that many like us have traveled successfully before. They offer us a map suggesting the best route, in Twelve who wants to improve his position. Steps. They have posted signs along the way--signs of encouragement or signals of possible dangers--and arc even ready to help if we stray from the road a bit.

We take the First Step along this road, of course, when we admit we are powerless over alcohol, that our lives have become unmanageable. Oh yes, we have in the past admitted secretly to ourselves, in our saner moments, that alcohol was making a mess of us and that we were making a mess of the lives of others. But such temporary admissions only added to our quilt and forced us to seek another drink to forget it all. Our First Step, our first admission within AA, is guite different. No longer are we resentfully admitting part-time powerlessness or occasional unmanageability. We admit total helplessness. We ask for help.

AA tells us about the disease of alcoholism, the cause of our trouble. We learn that we are its victims. This is a good start. Now we realize that we were not always the horrible people we thought we were. In the nature of our disease, much of what we did was not entirely our choice.

We learn that alcoholism is a physical allergy coupled with a mental obsession. One drink set up in our bodies a compulsion which by ourselves we were totally unable to resist. In our minds, many drinks created an obsession which blinded us to reality, giving alcohol a value which, in fact, it never had.

Now, with this knowledge and a desire to stop drinking, we are prepared to follow directions, to do what is prescribed for an alcoholic The directions are clearly outlined. They come to us at meetings, from our new friends in AA, and from our books and pamphlets.

All of these outline the AA way of life, to be lived one day at a time, without alcohol. We learn that we cannot live haphazardly or carelessly. We cannot follow our whims nor always do just what we want to do. We don't want to live dangerously. We see other alcoholics following directions and staying sober. (Just so, we have observed that people who have arrested cases of diabetes or tuberculosis live well as long as they observe the way of life prescribed by their physicians.)

The Twelve Steps outline the AA way of life clearly. They take us, a step at a time, along a road which hundreds of thousands of recovered alcoholics have traveled before us. The Steps sum up their way of living successfully. For any anxiety or problem that might have prompted a return to alcohol, they found the solution in the Twelve Steps. We, too, can live that way.

Related to and supporting the Twelve Steps arc the many other

features of this new AA way of life. There are our meetings, with our home groups and wherever we travel. There is my phone call to you, and your call back to me. You tell me a bit of your experience, and you hear some of mine. We get to know each other.

There is our literature, giving us inspiration, strength, and courage for the journey and giving us also a common language, understood throughout all of AA.

All that AA has gathered together for us results in an enrichment of our lives which we can call only "the help for ourselves--then we reach AA way of life." This enrichment comes slowly, gradually, and continuously. It comes in addition to better mental and physical health and growth. It appears in new ide-

als, new ambitions, new interests, new attitudes, new capabilities, and new accomplishments, which never were at any time a part of our drinking lives, nor could we have imagined them then, even in our wildest dreams.

The only requirements are to stop drinking and, with an open mind and as much honesty as we can command, to give serious and steady attention to all that AA is offering us.

Our new road leads to a genuine interest in others and a desire to share this way of life with them. We are no longer alone. We accept out and aid those who seek our experience, our understanding, and the grace of God given us so abundantly.

A Card for a Guard **AA WORKS IN PRISON, TOO**

"SAY, Bub, what's the good of AA drink in here," said the guard, scrutinizing Bub with a skeptical eye.

"True enough," answered Bub, "there are no cocktail lounges or taverns behind these walls, and we are free of that kind of temptation. But actually that is not our problem. The kernel of the problem lies in socializing ourselves by developing right thinking. And that goes for you alkies outside, too."

"Humph!" snorted the guard, "you guys didn't get in here by going to Sunday school!"

"Of course not. Some of us have in prison? You can't get anything to something else along with our alcoholism--criminality."

> "Well, I'm surprised that you admitted it! And how do you expect AA to handle that problem for you?"

> "Look, officer, basically AA is a new way of life for us. We learn that to stay sober we must live with our conscience, not by yours, nor by Joe Blow's, but by our own."

"Suppose you have no conscience?"

at this time it has achieved considerable stability and attracts approximately 20 members who realize that their main trouble is alcohol.

The greatest problem of the alcoholic confined at Fort Jay is the fact that liquor is very, very easy to procure and that many of the men find it very difficult to repress the desire to use it. Men working in officers' guarters, messes, and clubs continually have access to the liquor stocks if they so desire. This availability of alcohol, together with the many disappointments the prisoner is likely to receive while on the island, couple to make the work of A.A. in many cases very difficult.

For example, the inmate possibly has been "sweating out" a parole board for two or three months. Then one day he is called over to the main office and told that his parole has been disapproved by the Department of the Army in Washington. Now what is his first reaction? It is basically this:

The inmate has been keeping "on the ball" for months on end, keeping out of trouble and possibly doing a little more than his share and then the Army shows its appreciation by disapproving his parole. He does not stop to realize that there may be some very sound reasons for denying his parole. He doesn't see all of this and the first thought that flashes into his mind is raising a little hell. Getting good and drunk. With these thoughts in mind he heads for the nearest liquor, gets all soused up, gets disciplinary punishment and probably loses some good conduct time, his trustee status and gets a transfer to a maximum security prison.

Crises come up in the confinement of every inmate. Some are saved by the fact that they are nonalcoholics, but we alcoholics do not have such immunity. This is where A.A. steps in. By living from day to day the A.A. way the inmate keeps out of trouble until the crisis is over.

repair that which we have left of a conscience by application of the Twelve Steps."

"Huh huh, what about you birds who go out of prison, get drunk, get into trouble again and come right back in here?"

Bub squirmed, but said, "We have failed to get the AA Program because of our exalted egos and our inability to get out from ourselves, because we are smug in our own concepts of life, therefore we can find no room in our mind for thinking that does not conform with ours. And that Mr. Officer applies to the outside AA that has a great big bust. Yeah, and some AAs rush to his rescue with hush hush expressions on their sanctimonious faces. Gradually and gently he is wooed back into the warmth and shelter of AA. Us cons and excons aren't wooed, not by a danged siaht!"

"Bub, you sound bitter and ugly."

"Sir, it's not exactly like I said. It's hard to explain what I just said, for I'm in the middle of my trouble, looking outward and away from the situation."

"That sounds like a politician's answer, to me" said the guard.

"Maybe it does sound that way," continued Bub, "but there's where my ego comes into the picture. Now, I don't try to answer all the questions that plaque me, by and from my own resources, any more. I go to many places for the answers. One of them is to the Power Greater than myself. Another place is right back to the Twelve Steps and inventory. And I'm learning to know the difference and to accept the things I cannot

change."

Bub fished a card from his shirt pocket and, without saying a word, handed it to the quard.

It being Saturday and an AA meeting on hand, Bub took the stairs in high gear to the meeting room. There he fired up the group with a mighty oration on king size egos.

Physical hangovers were overcome. . . given time; spiritual hangovers are overcome given a lifetime. In our eagerness to reach that Through the grace of God, let us goal, let us not become careless and begin to trample on the things we need most.

When we have become well enough to find fault with each other, and to criticize our group life, we have also become well enough to take a better personal inventory and to accept the challenge to change ourselves, and to be grateful to be able to accept our limitations with God given humility; to be

thankful that it has been primarily the tolerance, understanding and compassion of others which has kept us sober.

We cannot keep for too long principles which we will not allow others to exercise: freedom of expression freedom to understand the Power greater than ourselves as we need to. It would be folly to exchange the enslavement of active alcoholism for active self will.

never become so sober that we cannot remember to think as a drunk. The new man, like you and me, has nowhere else to bring his thoughts, ideas, and appeals for understanding, but here. Live and let live and let's always live together in happy understanding.
