What's Wrong With Personalities? Plenty!

Anonymity is an expression of humility and an antidote to "self-will run riot

ANONYMITY, as we observe it in AA, is at root a simple expression of humility. The Twelve Steps of AA are vital to individual sobriety, but the Steps, if not carefully encased in protective Traditions, would soon be open to all kinds of individual interpretations--some good, some perhaps divisive. The Twelve Traditions, hammered out the hard way from experience, maintain our essential unity and assure the continuation of the Fellowship. And *all* the Traditions rest on the idea of anonymity as our "spiritual foundation . . . ever reminding us to place principles before personalities."

And what, we may ask, is wrong with personality? Plenty!--when in excess--as we sadly learned during our pre-AA lives. We've read and accepted the description of "self-will run riot," and we're painfully aware of the killing nature of uncontrolled egos. We know all too well the dangers of making principles fit the needs of personalities. Many of us nearly died trying to do so.

Typically, as a drinking alcoholic, I became an expert at rationalizing. I "knew," deep inside, that I was the center of the universe. My problem, of course, was that I could never get the

Psst! Hey, Buddy!

"Traditions" isn't really a dirty word

NOBODY WANTS to talk about the Traditions. "We don't want to hear about all the politics stuff! Let's talk recovery program!"

Really?

What do we talk about when we take a newcomer to a meeting? We sure don't talk recovery program! Can you visualize a newcomer sitting, shaking, worried, fearful in the front seat of the car riding to his or her first meeting?

The AA sponsor announces, "We're going to help you recover from your alcoholism with this Twelve Step program. First, you'll admit you're powerless. Then, you'll surrender to God, take a moral inventory, and confess your faults."

The newcomer fumbles for the door handle. "Surrender to God? Confess my faults? Are you people some kind of religious nuts? Let me out of here!"

No, the AA sponsor talks soothingly about things like anonymity, no dues to pay, no bosses in AA, no affiliation with outside groups, no membership requirement except a desire to stop drinking--all to make our newcomer feel comfortable and protected. We talk Traditions to our people in AA long before we broach the sensitive subjects in the Steps.

We think AA will be around forever, but we have nothing to prove it--no AA buildings, towers, or monuments. We are no more permanent than the length of our office lease and the one year's prudent reserve in our treasury. Our groups are month-to-month tenants in churches and meeting halls. The clubhouses are not allied with AA; there, the groups rent meeting space only. The groups aren't well organized, have no bylaws or charters. Officers are elected for terms from six months to two years and resign at will. Meeting formats are loose and mostly unstructured. No policing force exists to make members conform to any rules or regulations.

AA does have a service structure, but it is an upside-down pyramid, with the groups in charge over the board of trustees. With groups as loosely designed as they are, one is tempted to think about comparison to the strength of a chain. If AA is as strong as its weakest group--just how well is AA equipped to survive?

What ever happened to the Washingtonian Society? In pre-Civil War days, they claimed half a million members who helped sober up other drunks. Abraham Lincoln gave a speech to them that we in AA treasure today. The Oxford Group, which sobered up Ebby T. to carry a message to our co-founder Bill W., is gone. Buchmanism, named for Frank Buchman, who started the Oxford Group, turned into Moral Rearmament; both are gone. Who is to say that AA won't have a similar obituary in some article about alcoholism treatment in the year 2085 AD?

Some groups have Tradition meetings. Formats vary. Two groups that we know of read and discuss a Tradition once a month. Another group reads the AA pamphlet, "The Twelve Traditions Illustrated" and discusses them during the meetings in November,

Traditions month. Another group puts on the Traditions play (copies available through the AA General Service Office), which gives a hilarious look at the results of breaking the Traditions and opens the door to discussion and understanding by the members.

One longtime member of a group summed it all up when he said, "You know, I voted against these Tradition meetings. And I refused to comment during the discussion. But I have to admit that now we are doing the Traditions, I'm beginning to enjoy it!" It's simple.

Informed members in AA will tell you that if groups follow the Traditions, AA will survive and grow and, for a long time to come, continue to carry the message to the alcoholic who still suffers.

universe to acknowledge my position, so who could blame such an important person for drinking?

Alcoholics Anonymous reversed that attitude in my life, and taught me that the individual ego flowers best when it is properly nourished by principles of selflessness, humility, and love. And along with those principles, AA nurtures an attitude of modesty, certainly the perfect accompaniment to anonymity.

The personalities of Dr. Bob and Bill are known to us because they were the founders of AA. The principle of anonymity came into being and then turned into the essential foundation of all the Traditions during their time with us. Since that early period of the Fellowship, we note that the great contributions to AA--in all levels and areas of AA service work--have been selfless, modest, and


more often than not, nameless.

Bill showed us the way in these lines: "In a spiritual sense, anonymity amounts to the renunciation of personal prestige as an instrument of general policy."

"Prestige" is a fancy word for pride or ego, and I think the quotation sums up beautifully the central paradox in AA: By giving up, we begin to win; by putting down the ego, we pick up self-knowledge and self-respect; and by working selflessly, we earn great personal richness.

My strength is the strength each of you in AA gives me. My future is in your hands--and yours in mine. We stand together in AA--or we fall apart.





THE AA PREAMBLE: BACKGROUND INFORMATION

THE PREAMBLE was introduced in the June 1947 issue of the AA Grapevine magazine. It was written by the then-editor, who borrowed much of the phrasing from the Foreword to the original edition of the Big Book, *Alcoholics Anonymous*.

In those early years, the Grapevine had just begun to circulate among nonalcoholics, and the Preamble was intended primarily to describe for them what AA is and is not. It is still often used for public information purposes. As time passed, it began appearing in all Conference-approved publications, and many AA groups now use it to open meetings.

The original version differed in two ways from the familiar form we all know: 1) It stated that the only requirement for membership is an *honest* desire to stop drinking," and 2) it contained only the very brief statement "AA has no dues or fees."

People often ask why the word "honest" was deleted. At the 1958 General Service Conference, a delegate asked about the words "honest desire to stop drinking," suggesting that since "honest" does not appear in the Third Tradition, it might be deleted from the Preamble. In discussion, most Conference members felt that as AA had matured, it had become almost impossible to determine what constitutes an honest desire to stop drinking, and also that some who might be interested in the program could be confused by the phrase. Thus, as part of the evolution of AA, the phrase had been dropped from common usage. The midsummer 1958 meeting of the General Service Board of Trustees ratified the deletion, and since then the Preamble has read simply "a desire to stop drinking."

At the same time, the phrase "AA has no dues or fees" was clarified to read as it presently does: "There are no dues or fees for AA membership; we are self-supporting through our own contributions." The current version of the Preamble appears on page one of every issue of the Grapevine.

At the 71st General Service Conference in 2021, after a series of votes, a final Advisory Action requested that "The Preamble revision replacing the words 'men and women' with the word 'people' be presented to the General Service Board for approval as the new revised A.A. Preamble." The revised A.A. Preamble first appeared in the July 2021 AA Grapevine and the July/August La Viña, and afterwards throughout Grapevine and A.A.W.S. literature and other media.





EGO GOOD? EGO BAD?

Here follows a description of the evolution of our ego. This is followed by Sigmund's Freud's disclosure of its purpose.

- From an evolutionary perspective, ego is surmised to have evolved from self-awareness. Selfawareness is particularly advantageous for social animals like us — humans. It gives us an idea about our strengths, weaknesses, our role and position in the society and also to understand other's behavior.
- When Freud developed psychoanalytic theory, he used the German word es (Ego in English) to describe the part of the self that is responsible for decision making.

Consequently, I understand our ego is an inherited filter that protects us from outside hazards and perilous internal decisions. Without our egos humans could never have survived the slings and arrows of time. Our ego is to be considered a benevolent human psychological component. As Dr. Freud explained, it is a thought filter—a decision making apparatus.

Although this may seem an unusual glowing report for which is often given an extremely bad rap around the AA tables, but we *can* experience a benevolent healthy ego that keeps us *happy, joyous, and free*. (p. 133) However, our egos sometimes may go out of whack and become disastrous to us and to our fellows, e.g.:

The secular driven ego filter that lives in deep fear and elevates ordinary situations out of proportion. We begin to consider ourselves big shots (egomaniacs), unable to see another's point of view, often insulting, uncaring of others, selfcentered to the max, and all the rest of it. We can easily see how this dangerous disorder can lead alcoholics to that first drink.

However:

As the result of living the Twelve Steps, a **God inspired ego filter** takes precedence over the fear and destructive behavior of the **secular driven ego**. Page 85 tells us: "The problem (mental obsession) has been removed. It does not exist for us so long as we remain in a fit spiritual condition." (p. 85)
